From Eureka: Take 101 North past Arcata to exit 716A for Hwy 299 East. Continue on 299 E for 37.6 miles to Willow Creek, CA, then turn left onto Hwy 96 East. Stay on 96 E for 37.5 miles, then turn left onto Ishi-Pishi Road in Orleans, CA. Sandy Bar Ranch will be approximately one mile down the road on the right hand side.

From Redding: Take Hwy 299 West for approximately 90 miles to Willow Creek, CA. Turn right onto Hwy 96 East. Stay on 96 E for 37.5 miles, then turn left onto Ishi-Pishi Road in Orleans, CA. Sandy Bar Ranch will be approximately one mile down the road on the right hand side.

From Sacramento: Take I-5 for approximately I60 miles to Redding, CA. Take exit 678 to merge onto Hwy 44 West toward Eureka. After about a mile, use the right 2 lanes to turn right onto CA-273 N/Pine St (signs for CA-299/Weaverville/Eureka). Merge onto Hwy 299 West, and continue on 299 W for 91 miles to Willow Creek, CA. Turn right onto Hwy 96 East. Stay on 96 E for 37.5 miles, then turn left onto Ishi-Pishi Road in Orleans, CA. Sandy Bar Ranch will be approximately one mile down the road on the right hand side.

Camping Info. Please come to the Confab prepared to camp. You should bring a tent, sleeping bag, sleeping pad, pillow, flashlight, water bottle, comfortable shoes, sunscreen, and anything else you would need to be comfortable.

Cabins There are five cabins available at Sandy Bar ranch that are \$65 per night per person for the first two-people and \$25 per night for each additional person. To check cabin availability or to reserve a cabin and make payment, please email *maddie@calsalmon.org*

Come Prepared Please bring layers of clothes, sunscreen, a sun hat, a personal water bottle, flashlight, and river & hiking shoes. For the Juvenile Salmonid Identification workshop, please bring a wetsuit, snorkel, and mask. No dogs allowed.
